

## WORLD LANGUAGES

The study of a second language and culture enriches the students' understanding of their own language and culture, helps increase both the verbal and math SAT scores and provides critical life skills to function in our global and interconnected society. Guided by a proficiency-based approach to instruction, the department encourages all students not only to begin the study of a second language, but also to continue to study their language of choice for a minimum of three years. In order to achieve high levels of proficiency, students should study the same language for as many years as possible. Students are also encouraged to study a second world language at RHS.

Department expectations: For success in all languages and at all levels, students should be prepared daily. They are expected to actively participate in all aspects of class (listening, speaking, reading, writing, and cultural studies) as appropriate to their target language.

### LEVELS OF LANGUAGE OFFERINGS

General Level: For students who are not enrolled in a college preparatory program of studies. Class participation through listening, speaking, and note taking is required. Conversational ability with the language is stressed. The general level courses do not meet the requirements of a foreign language course of study for college entrance, but will help prepare students who need extra review time to be able to take a college preparatory course. Homework will be assigned on a regular basis.

College Level: For students who are planning to attend college and who are willing to study independently to increase their knowledge. This level emphasizes acquisition of vocabulary and comprehension of grammar and language structure. The four language skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing are stressed. Students are expected to do daily homework.

Honors Level: For independent learners who want to excel in the language and who will use problem-solving skills to apply and to extend the concepts taught in class. The four language skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing are stressed. Teachers use the target language considerably during each class for communication. Students are also expected to communicate in the target language. Consistent preparation outside of class is essential as these courses progress at an accelerated level.

Advanced Placement Level: Self-motivated students will prepare to take the Advanced Placement Exam through consistent use of the target language and will continue to develop the four language skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The emphasis in the Latin course is vocabulary building, translations, and literary interpretation.

Early College Experience: This course offered in French and Spanish is open to students who have successfully completed French IV / French IV-B or Spanish IV / Spanish IV-B respectively and/or by teacher recommendation and coordinator approval.

## WORLD LANGUAGE COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

### **FRENCH I - COLLEGE (3305)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: This course is recommended for students in a College Preparatory program.

Description: Through active participation, level one students begin to communicate in French as they learn to understand, speak, read, and write in this useful language. The students also become familiar with the culture of the French-speaking world through readings, movies, taped recordings, and discussions. Students are required to do daily homework and spend time reviewing and preparing for tests outside of class. Organizational and time management skills are essential to being successful in this course.

### **FRENCH I – HONORS (3406)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: This beginner level honors course is open to all students. This course is highly recommended for students who are already enrolled in other languages and are interested in accelerating their study of a second world language.

Description: This course will introduce students to the French language and the cultures of the countries where French is spoken. Students will develop listening, speaking, writing, and reading strategies with an emphasis on oral and written forms of communication through active participation. Students in the honors level participate in all skill areas in greater depth and at an accelerated rate. They are expected to spend extra time out-of-class preparing for tests and reviewing new concepts. Daily preparation is essential to being successful in this course.

### **FRENCH II - COLLEGE (3306)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: Successful completion of French I - College or its equivalent is with a minimum grade of 70 required.

Description: The level two course begins with a review of vocabulary, grammar and verb usage. Continuing from level one, the students strengthen their skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing through active participation. The students increase their knowledge of the culture of the French-speaking world through related readings, videos, and recordings. Students are required to do daily homework and spend time reviewing and preparing for tests outside of class. Organizational and time management skills are essential to being successful in this course.

**FRENCH III - COLLEGE (3307)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: Successful completion of French II - College or its equivalent with a minimum grade of 70 is required.

Description: The students review and continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing. This level continues to stress the use of the French language in class by the student and by the teacher in order to build and reinforce useful vocabulary, to practice language skills, and to discuss a variety of cultural topics. Students should demonstrate a commitment to increasing their knowledge of French. Students are required to do daily homework and spend time reviewing and preparing for tests outside of class. Organizational and time management skills are essential to being successful in this course.

**FRENCH II - HONORS (3407)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: A grade average of 85 or higher in French I - Honors or the VCMS level one program or a grade average of 88 or higher in French I - College is strongly recommended.

Description: This course begins with a review of vocabulary, grammar, and verb usage. As a continuation from level one, the students strengthen their skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing through active participation. The students increase their knowledge of the culture of the French-speaking world through related readings, videos, and recordings. Students in the honors level participate in all skill areas in greater depth and at an accelerated rate.

**FRENCH III - HONORS (3408)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: A grade average of 85 or higher in French II - Honors or a grade average of 88 or higher in French II - College is strongly recommended.

Description: The students review and continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The honors level continues to stress the constant use of the French language in class by students and the teacher in order to build and reinforce useful vocabulary, to practice language skills, and to discuss a wide variety of cultural topics. Students in the honors level participate in all skill areas in greater depth and at an accelerated rate.

**FRENCH IV - HONORS (3409)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: A grade average of 85 or higher in French III - Honors or a grade average of 88 or higher in French III - College is strongly recommended.

Description: This course promotes achievement and higher levels of proficiency in the French language and an increased awareness and understanding of France and the French-speaking world. Through an understanding of a variety of prepared and authentic materials, students build their accuracy in the four language skills areas. Vocabulary related to professions and certain fields of work such as health, education, travel, and other trades will be reviewed. Tasks may include language lab work, audio and video taping, skits, composition writing, and extended readings, in addition to regular classroom activities. This class is conducted almost exclusively in French.

**FRENCH IV-B – HONORS (3414)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: A grade average of 85 or higher in French III - Honors or a grade average of 88 or higher in French III - College is strongly recommended.

Description: This course is for students who are interested in careers in social services and business. The activities are based on real situations in the United States and in French speaking countries. Students will use the target language at all times in the classroom. The use of the multimedia language laboratory will be required and the further development of speaking and listening skills will be emphasized. In addition, students will participate in activities outside of the classroom in order to test their actual accomplishments.

**FRENCH V – HONORS (3410)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: Successful completion of French IV – Honors or its equivalent is required.

Description: Conducted exclusively in French, this course provides students with the continued opportunity to develop their skills in French with an emphasis on essay and composition in preparation for college level work. Areas of study may include topics of special interest to the students: the culture of the French-speaking world, contemporary France; reading selections by French literary masters; and authentic audio and video programs. Grammar and vocabulary are reviewed in context and/or as needed. Students are encouraged to participate actively in all discussions and activities. Depending on enrollment, this course will run concurrently with the Advanced Placement Spanish course.

**FRENCH V – ECE (3504)****University of Connecticut Early College Experience\***

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.08

Prerequisites: Successful completion of French IV Honors or French IVB Honors with an average of 88 or higher is recommended.

Description: This Early College Experience course is equivalent to the French 3267 and French 3268W courses at the University of Connecticut. French V ECE will combine these courses to include “Intermediate French Composition,” which provides a thorough review of grammar and methodical practice in composition leading to command of practical idioms and vocabulary, and “French Conversation: Cultural Topics,” an in-depth development of speaking skills through cultural readings, group discussions and oral presentations on selected topics concerning the French-speaking world. Students in this course may elect to take (and pay for) the Advanced Placement French Language exam (extra materials will be provided to prepare for this spring exam).

\* Students who successfully meet the expectations of the Early College Experience requirement will have the opportunity to earn 6 college credits from the University of Connecticut. There is a \$150 non-refundable registration fee for students who elect this ECE course.

**GERMAN I - COLLEGE (3311)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: This course is recommended for students in a College Preparatory program.

Description: Through active participation, level one students begin to develop proficiency in German as they learn to understand, speak, read, and write in this useful language, now the important language of Central Europe and the European Community. Students also become familiar with the culture of the German-speaking world through readings, audio and video recordings, and discussions.

**GERMAN I – HONORS (3416)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: This beginner level honors course is open to all students. This course is highly recommended for students who are already enrolled in other languages and are interested in accelerating their study of a second world language.

Description: This course will introduce students to the German language and the cultures of the countries where German is spoken. Students will develop listening, speaking, writing, and reading strategies with an emphasis on oral and written forms of communication through active participation. Students in the honors level participate in all skill areas in greater depth and at an accelerated rate. They are expected to spend extra time out-of-class preparing for tests and reviewing new concepts. Daily preparation is essential to being successful in this course.

**GERMAN II - COLLEGE (3312)**

Full Year                      Credit 1.00                      Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: Successful completion of German I - College or its equivalent is required.

Description: In this continuation of level one, students strengthen their skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing through active participation, and increase their knowledge of the German-speaking world through related readings, videos, recordings and the Internet.

**GERMAN III - COLLEGE (3313)**

Full Year                      Credit 1.00                      Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: Successful completion of German II - College or its equivalent is required.

Description: The students review and continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The level three course continues to stress the constant use of German in class by students and the teacher in order to build and reinforce a useful vocabulary, to practice language skills, to discuss a wider variety of cultural topics, to read some excerpts of German literature, and to access German topics on the Internet.

**GERMAN IV - HONORS (3412)**

Full Year                      Credit 1.00                      Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: Successful completion of German III - College or its equivalent is required.

Description: The emphasis of the course is on reading and building greater proficiency in all the skills of language learning. Cultural material is viewed through a variety of reading materials, videos, recordings, and the Internet. All grammar is presented and reinforced. This course is designed for motivated students with a high level of interest in the German language and culture.

**LATIN** – Rockville High School will not be offering courses in Latin for the 2011-2012 school year.

**SPANISH I - GENERAL (3201)**

Full Year                      Credit 1.00                      Weight 1.02

Prerequisites: This course is recommended for students in a Practical or General program.

Description: This beginning course is offered to students who are not in the college preparatory program and who have an interest in learning the language and culture of the Spanish-speaking world. Emphasis is placed on developing listening and speaking skills. Students also begin to learn to read and write in Spanish. Culture is studied through projects and videos where students learn about the people and customs of Spanish-speaking countries. This class calls for students to be active participants and listeners and be consistently prepared.

**SPANISH II - GENERAL (3202)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.02

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Spanish I General or its equivalent is required.

Descriptions: The emphasis of this course is to strengthen and expand the students' knowledge of the basic material of Spanish I through conversation, composition and short readings that provide insight into the culture of the Spanish-speaking world. Students in this course may continue studying Spanish the following year in Spanish I College. This course requires that students be active participants and listeners and be consistently prepared.

**SPANISH I - COLLEGE (3301)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: This course is recommended for students in a College Preparatory program or for those who have successfully completed Spanish II - General or have excelled in Spanish I – General and have teacher recommendation.

Description: Through active participation, level one students begin to communicate in Spanish as they learn to understand, speak, read, and write this useful language. Students also become familiar with the culture of the Spanish-speaking world through readings, movies, taped recordings, and discussions. This class calls for students to be active participants and listeners. Students are required to do daily homework and spend time reviewing and preparing for tests outside of class. Organizational and time management skills are essential to being successful in this course.

**SPANISH II - COLLEGE (3302)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Spanish I - College or its equivalent with a minimum average of 70 is required (or a grade average of 90 or higher in Spanish II - General and recommendation of the teacher).

Description: This course begins with a review of vocabulary, grammar and verb usage. As a continuation from level one, students strengthen their skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing through active participation. Students increase their knowledge of the culture of the Spanish-speaking world through related readings, videos, and recordings. This course requires that students be active participants and listeners. Students are required to do daily homework and spend time reviewing and preparing for tests outside of class. Organizational and time management skills are essential to being successful in this course.

**SPANISH III - COLLEGE (3303)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Spanish II - College or its equivalent with a minimum grade of 70 is required.

Description: The students review vocabulary and grammar and continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing. This level continues to stress the increased use of the foreign language in class by the students and the teacher in order to build vocabulary and to practice language skills. A variety of cultural topics are discussed. This class calls for students to be active listeners and active participants. Students are required to do daily homework and spend time reviewing and preparing for tests outside of class. Organizational and time management skills are essential to being successful in this course.

**SPANISH IV - COLLEGE (3304)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Spanish III - College or its equivalent with a minimum grade of 75 is required.

Description: This course assists students in developing greater proficiency in the four skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing through vocabulary & language activities. A major and important focus of this level of Spanish will be on professions and vocabulary related to certain fields of work such as health, education, travel, and other trades. Cultural material is presented through readings, television & radio programs, videos and other prepared materials. This class requires that students be active participants and listeners. Students are required to do daily homework and spend time reviewing and preparing for tests outside of class. Organizational and time management skills are essential to being successful in this course.

**SPANISH V – COLLEGE (3315)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.04

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Spanish IV - College or its equivalent is required.

Description: This course is designed for students who successfully complete Spanish IV - College or Honors. The emphasis of the course is in strengthening listening, reading, speaking, and writing skills at this level. Selected readings, contemporary and historic issues from the Spanish-speaking world, and cultural videos serve as sources of vocabulary, discussion and writing topics that reinforce all language skills. Students are required to do daily homework and spend time reviewing and preparing for tests outside of class. Organizational and time management skills are essential to being successful in this course.

**SPANISH I – HONORS (3401)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: This beginner level honors course is open to all students. This course is highly recommended for students who are already enrolled in other languages and are interested in accelerating their study of a second world language.

Description: This course will introduce students to the Spanish language and the cultures of the countries where Spanish is spoken. Students will develop listening, speaking, writing, and reading strategies with an emphasis on oral and written forms of communication through active participation. Description: This course begins with a review of vocabulary, grammar and verb usage. As a continuation from level one, students strengthen their skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing through active participation. Students increase their knowledge of the culture of the Spanish-speaking world through related readings, videos, and recordings. Students in the honors level participate in all skill areas in greater depth and at an accelerated rate. They are expected to spend extra time out-of-class preparing for tests and reviewing new concepts. Daily preparation is essential to being successful in this course.

**SPANISH III – HONORS (3403)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: A grade average of 85 or higher in Spanish II - Honors or a grade average of 88 or higher in Spanish II - College is required.

Description: The students review and continue to develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The honors level continues to stress the constant use of the foreign language in class by the students and the teacher in order to build vocabulary, to practice language skills, and to discuss a wide variety to cultural topics. Students in the honors level participate in all skill areas in greater depth and at an accelerated rate. They are expected to spend extra time out-of-class preparing for tests and reviewing new concepts. Daily preparation is essential to being successful in this course.

**SPANISH IV – HONORS (3404)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: A grade average of 85 or higher in Spanish III - Honors or a grade average of 88 or higher in Spanish III - College is required.

Description: This course has two areas of concentration. The first area emphasizes the development of composition skills by means of an in-depth study and application of grammar, vocabulary, and idioms. The second area allows the student to develop a proficiency in oral expression by means of classroom discussion and use of the language lab. A major and important focus of this level of Spanish will be on professions and vocabulary related to certain fields of work such as health, education, travel, and other trades. Topics for compositions and discussions are generated from selected readings of varying types, current events, and audio and video productions. Students in the honors level participate in all skill areas in greater depth and at an accelerated rate. They are expected to spend extra time out-of-class preparing for tests and reviewing new concepts. Daily preparation is essential to being successful in this course.

**SPANISH IV-B – HONORS (3415)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: A grade average of 85 or higher in Spanish III - Honors or a grade average of 88 or higher in Spanish III - College is required.

Description: This course is for students who are interested in careers in social services and business. The activities are based on real situations in the United States and in Spanish speaking countries. Students will use the target language at all times in the classroom. The use of the multimedia language laboratory will be required and the further development of speaking and listening skills will be emphasized. In addition, students will participate in activities outside of the classroom in order to test their actual accomplishments.

**SPANISH V – HONORS (3405)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Spanish IV - Honors or its equivalent is required.

Description: This course offers advanced practice in speaking and writing. Also, the course continues the study of Spanish-speaking people, their roots and their present, through reading selected works by the recognized masters of Spanish and Latin American literature. Depending on enrollment, this class will run concurrently with the Advanced Placement Spanish course. They are expected to spend extra time out-of-class preparing for tests and reviewing new concepts. Daily preparation is essential to being successful in this course.

**SPANISH V – ECE (3505)****University of Connecticut Early College Experience\***

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.08

Prerequisites: Prior successful completion of Spanish IV or Spanish IV-B with an average of 88 or higher is recommended.

Description: This Early College Experience course is equivalent to the Spanish 3178 and Spanish 3179 courses at the University of Connecticut. Spanish V ECE will combine these courses to include “Intermediate Spanish Composition,” which provides a thorough review of grammar and methodical practice in composition leading to command of practical idioms and vocabulary, and “Spanish Conversation: Cultural Topics,” an in-depth development of speaking skills through cultural readings, group discussions and oral presentations on selected topics concerning the Spanish-speaking world. Students in this course may elect to take (and pay for) the Advanced Placement Spanish Language exam (extra materials will be provided to prepare for this spring exam).

\* Students who successfully meet the expectations of the Early College Experience requirement will have the opportunity to earn 6 college credits from the University of Connecticut. There is a \$150 non-refundable registration fee for students who elect this ECE course.

**TENTATIVE COURSE**

This course has been proposed for the World Languages Department for the 2011-2012 school year and is pending approval by the Vernon Board of Education.

**GERMAN II – HONORS (3417)**

Full Year

Credit 1.00

Weight 1.06

Prerequisites: Prior successful completion of German I – Honors with a grade of 85 or higher) or German I – College (with a grade of 88 or higher) is strongly recommended. Teacher recommendation is also required.

Description: As a continuation from German I - Honors, students in this course will strengthen their communicative skills through active participation in listening, speaking, reading, and writing activities. They will increase their knowledge and understanding of German-speaking countries and culture. Students in the honors level participate in all communicative activities in greater depth and at a faster pace. They are expected to devote extra out-of-class time to prepare for tests and work on longer-term projects. Regular participation is essential to success in this course.
